Associate Professor Carol Ma is known among academia and the community sector as an active and passionate practitioner of Service-Learning (S-L) and aging in Asia. She believes S-L can contribute to a win-win situation for all stakeholders including teachers, students, communities, and the regions of Asia. As an energetic and committed scholar, Assoc. Prof. Carol Ma has published books and articles on S-L and aging in refereed journals and policy papers for global agencies, including UNESCAP and US higher education institutions.

Currently, she is leading the curriculum development, community engagement, and research in gerontology and promoting transdisciplinary education to address aging issues at Singapore University of Social Sciences.

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2) Sharing by Canberra Secondary School

Title

Character transformation and active citizenry through the School's GRC (Grateful, Respectful and Compassionate) Values

Synopsis

Canberra Secondary School has embarked on building a culture of regular service which is aligned to the school's mission 'Care. Aspire. Nurture.' and vision of nurturing 'Grateful, Respectful and Compassionate (GRC) Canberrans'. The school's GRC education, centred on the service-learning pedagogy, L.I.F.E curriculum (LLP Tier 1) and CCA-VIA (LLP Tier 2), formalises the approach the school undertakes to involve students and staff in fulfilling its responsibility to the community. To promote a school-wide culture of regular service, GRC education was conceptualised in 2018. It entails our students serving their school, families and community regularly, thereby, experiencing the transformative L.I.F.E. curriculum and CCA-VIA programme.

Why service-learning? How has this impacted our students and our community? How then would we live out our commitment in the new normal?

In this concurrent session, we seek to answer these questions by presenting the following:

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3) Sharing by Methodist Girls' School

Title

Towards an asset-based Intergenerational Learning Model

Synopsis

At MGS, we believe that Intergenerational Learning (IGL) can bolster a young person's ability to thrive and energise the older person's affinity for giving back through positive guidance of the next generation. When the young and old develop meaningful and purposeful relationships, the young develop their sense of self-worth and meaning while the lives of the seniors become enriched and more purposeful as their desire for affinity becomes fulfilled.

In this concurrent session, we will start with providing the national context and establishing the guiding principles of sound IGL programming. Thereafter, the session will look at the different IGL learning modes and their potential merits and practical challenges. We hope that through the facilitation and shared conversations, you will find ideas and support for the possible implementation of IGL in your area of work. Do note that this session is not structured to be a "show-and-tell" of IGL activities done at MGS but a session for heart-working educators to come together to converse and generate possibilities for IGL in our schools.

Serve with a Mission: Hildan Advocacy

Synopsis

In St. Hilda's Secondary School, Service Learning plays a crucial role in nurturing our students to become Caring and Collaborative Contributors of our nation who are proactive in advocating a meaningful cause of their choice. In order to catalyse student agency and create a meaningful experience for our students, a good approach, sound structure and comprehensive assessment play key roles in achieving the goals. Our school adopts the approach of having three departments (English, Humanities and CCE) to collaborate in an integrated advocacy project in order to provide a holistic learning experience for students.

- Quality questioning in guiding students' VIA process
- Assessment of VIA project

This session aims to advocate for strong families, help youths understand changes that come with adolescence, provide heartfelt experiences and practical handles. Learn to bridge generational gaps, strengthen family relationships by building understanding, trust and effective communication amidst the rapidly changing social atmosphere.
Community	Acorn Training Pte Ltd	Understanding the real needs of the community	A good research is necessary to understand the real needs of the community and not just what we perceive. Learn important interview skills to conduct primary source research. Learn cyber search skills to conduct secondary research. This course incorporates design thinking tools to equip participants with the ability to clearly frame the problem/need they want to solve.
Peer leadership	Singapore Kindness Movement	Promoting acts of kindness amongst peers	The Singapore Kindness Movement (SKM), in collaboration with inwardBOUND, has worked with many students through interactive theatre to unpack themes like cyberbullying to social integration. Be it questioning the intentions of keyboard warriors or coming up with solutions for problems on foreigner-local integration — we seek to engage students in ground-up dialogues through creative expression.

Together with the plants and other forms of rich biodiversity around us, these form a vital part of the natural heritage of our country.
